## National Youth Assembly of Ireland

An Overview of 2024



#### Introduction

The Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth established the National Youth Assembly of Ireland in 2022 to meet a commitment from the Programme for Government 2020. The DCEDIY collaborates closely with other government departments on convening Youth Assemblies on specific topics. Recommendations from Assemblies are intended to inform Government policy on areas such as climate, digitalisation, rural development and other issues of importance to young people.

The DCEDIY's National Participation Office (NPO) manages and coordinates the activities of youth participation structures, including the National Youth Assembly of Ireland, Comhairle na nÓg (Youth councils), Dáil na nÓg, the National Executive and other related youth participation initiatives and structures on behalf of the DCEDIY.

The National Youth Assembly of Ireland is based on the approach of participation with purpose, established on the principle of Article 12 of the UNCRC, where children and young people are facilitated to exercise their right to express their views and to have their views given due weight. The structure and proceedings of the National Youth Assembly is based on the Lundy Model of Participation in which children and young people are given:

Space: Safe, inclusive opportunities to form and express their views

Voice: Facilitation to express their views Audience: Their views are listened to

Influence: Their views are acted upon, as appropriate

The National Youth Assembly delegates are nominated from a wide range of organisations, in 2024 we had delegates (sitting and guest) from 78 youth groups, Comhairle na nÓg and community groups. Delegates were involved in much more than Assemblies, a number of delegates were part of Youth Advisory Groups (YAG), invited to a wide range of events, conferences and meetings. Delegates have represented the National Youth Assembly on a local, national and international level



### **Meet our Youth Advisory Group**



#### **Our Year**

"The Youth Advisory Group for the Assembly is made up of 14 delegates. The YAG met up for an in-person meeting at DCEDIY in Dublin earlier this year. We discussed what we'd like the Advisory Group to look like and what we'd like our role to be. Amongst many other discussions, we came up with the idea of training days and a communications platform. We worked with the NPO Communications Officer, Sinead and set up an Instagram page and a Linked In profile! The YAG have met up regularly online throughout the year and have worked on a number of initiatives. Our main focus was:

- Transport This has been the most raised topic over all assemblies to date.
- Social Media Presence When we joined the Assembly the lack of social media presence was noted.
- Delegate experience What could make the delegate experience better and what would support new members to the Assembly.

In July, the Youth Advisory Group wrote to the Department of Transport to request a National Youth Assembly on Transport. We acknowledged how transportation is a vital aspect of daily life, influencing everything from accessibility to sustainability, and recognised the need for youth voices to be heard on matters concerning transport policy and infrastructure development. We have received confirmation that the first National Youth Assembly on Transport will be happening next year. This assembly will serve as a platform for young people across Ireland to come together and have conversations which could shape the future of transportation in our country. We are really proud of putting this together and cannot wait to see the work that next year's cohort of delegates will do on this important topic."

## National Youth Assembly on Climate 2024

The National Youth Assembly on Climate 2024 convened on Thursday 11th April 2024, from 11am to 4pm. 67 youth delegates (aged 12 to 24) from across Ireland gathered at the DCEDIY offices, Miesian Plaza, Baggot Street, Dublin 2. The Assembly was opened by members of the Youth Advisory Group and a prerecorded video welcome from Minister for the Department of the Environment, Climate, and Communications was shown to the assembly. Minister for Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth of Ireland, Roderic O'Gorman also addressed the Assembly during this opening.

An interactive workshop took place in groups that included discussion about who could be engaged in climate action, how to engage people, and the challenges to engagement on climate issues. Delegates then created pen pictures of three types of individuals – those not engaged in climate action, those somewhat engaged with climate action and those very engaged with climate action. The delegates then took part in a World Café session which explored what the Government needs to do to engage the public on climate action. Following this session the Assembly reviewed the recommendations made during the World Café and voted on recommendations to Government. Delegates from the Assembly presented their draft recommendations to Dr. Robert Mooney (DECC) who then addressed the Assembly. Closing remarks were provided by the Youth Advisory Group. United Nations Youth Delegate for Ireland Mohammad Naeem attended the assembly as an independent observer to ensure that it was facilitated according to best practice in terms of youth participation.

On May 2nd 2024, following the confirmation of the delegates recommendations, an interactive webinar attended by Minister Ryan was convened. At this event, delegates presented the assembly's recommendations directly to Minister Ryan. Following the presentation of recommendations Mr. Ryan and key policy stakeholders across DECC, DCEDIY and the Department of Education responded with their views on the recommendations. At the end of the webinar, Minister Ryan opened the forum to a range of questions from delegates.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

Assembly on Climate represents a delivery of the commitment under the Programme through which young people can guide the direction of the National Climate Action

The third annual National Youth Assembly on Climate took place on the 11th April 2024. 67 youth delegates aged 12-24 from across Ireland attended, representing youth organisations, Comhairle na nÓg (Youth Councils) and other interested organisations. The delegates attended a preparation session in advance of the Assembly and then took part in a day of discussions. They have produced nine key recommendations for the Department of Environment, Climate and Communications and The Government to consider. These are outlined below.



#### **Education**

The Government should make sure that everyone has access to the same services and information about climate change. Climate change, sustainability and climate action should be actively taught in CSPE classes.









#### **Engagement**

The Government should provide opportunities for those who are engaged in climate action to have an influence at a decision making level. All people should have an equal voice in decisions. In order to keep people engaged in Climate action there should be initiatives, careers and reward systems in place.

## National Youth Assembly on Gender Equality 2024

The National Youth Assembly on Gender Equality convened on Wednesday, 25th September 2024 from 10am-4pm at the Decorative Arts and History Museum, Collins Barracks, Dublin. This assembly, jointly organised by the DCEDIY and a Youth Advisory Group, gathered 45 young delegates from rural and urban regions across Ireland to address ongoing issues of gender inequality. The assembly was specifically designed to provide young people with an opportunity to discuss how gender inequality affects their lives, explore solutions, and make recommendations that could be integrated into national policy. Attendees represented a wide range of geographic, socio-economic, and cultural backgrounds, ensuring that a diverse range of experiences were captured in the consultation.

The Assembly was opened by members of the Youth Advisory Group and Minister Roderic O'Gorman received the recommendations and closed the Assembly. The delegates engaged in multiple rounds of group work, where they discussed barriers to equality, proposed solutions, and formulated final recommendations. The first activity of the assembly was a moving debate. This activity aimed to spark conversation by asking delegates to respond to five statements designed to explore common stereotypes and assumptions about gender equality. Next delegates mapped out their views of gender equality across different stages of life, ranging from childhood to early adulthood. They used the following age ranges to frame their discussion: 4 to 12 years; 13 to 16 years; 17 to 20 years and 21 to 24 years. The final set of activities involved categorising issues into key themes and then discussing these themes in depth through a carousel format. Delegates rotated through stations that focused on the following six themes:

- 1. Women in leadership, politics, and jobs
- 2. Sport and leisure
- 3. Health
- 4. Language and stereotyping
- 5. Gender-based violence
- 6. Education

Each station included discussions on why these issues exist and what potential solutions could be implemented to create meaningful change. Delegates produced a series of actionable recommendations, which were later reviewed and voted on. These recommendations will form a central part of the strategy to be presented to the government.

An Infographic and a report from the Assembly will be available in early 2025.

Why did you join the Assembly?

There were also a lot of wonderful opportunities shared while I was on the assembly, and if I had the confidence earlier on, I would have gone for them.

### National Rural Youth Assembly 2024

The National Rural Youth Assembly convened on Wednesday, 27th November 2024 from 10am-4pm at Miesian Plaza, Dublin. This assembly, jointly organised by the Department of Rural and Community Development, the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth and the National Youth Assemblies Rural Youth Advisory Group, gathered 50 youth delegates from rural and urban regions across Ireland to address ongoing issues for rural young people. The assembly was specifically designed to provide young people with an opportunity to discuss how rural issues affects their lives, explore solutions, and make recommendations that could be integrated into national policy. Attendees represented a wide range of geographic, socio-economic, and cultural backgrounds, ensuring that a diverse range of experiences were captured in the consultation.

The delegates and Youth Advisory Group identified a list of themes in advance of the Assembly. These were voted on by the delegates and the top theme selected was 'Learning in Rural Ireland'. The department of Rural and Community Development selected the theme of 'Living and Working in Rural Ireland.

Twelve recommendations were created under these themes and presented to the Department of Rural and Community Development.

An infographic of recommendations and a report will be shared in early 2025.











## Representatives on Forums and Advisory Groups

Throughout the year delegates from the National Youth Assembly are invited to sit on various external forums and advisory groups. These are voluntary positions and the delegates are supported by Assembly staff to attend these. The contributions to the various forums and advisory groups by the delegates have ensured that young people have a voice in different areas that affect them and their peers.

#### Young Ireland Advisory Council

Young Ireland is the new policy framework for children and young people, published in November 2023. It envisages an Ireland in which all children and young people have their rights realised. Young Ireland is focused on tackling the biggest challenges that affect children and young people in Ireland today. The Young Ireland Advisory Council will give independent advice and support on policies that affect children and young people. Its members include members of civil society and independent experts, with experience of the issues that Young Ireland is trying to address, through their work, their lived experience or both.

The Advisory Council is made up of 16 members including three members from the National Youth Assembly of Ireland. Mateusz, AJ and Marwa are the nominated delegates who will sit on the Advisory Council going forward. They will link in with the rest of the Assembly delegates over the next two years.







#### **Online Health Taskforce**

On 4 September 2024, the Minister for Health Stephen Donnelly established an Online Health Taskforce to develop a public health response to harms caused to children and young people by certain types of online activity. The Taskforce is being chaired by children's rights advocate Jillian van Turnhout. It has been set up in recognition of a growing body of evidence from Ireland and internationally, showing the link between online activity and physical and mental health harm including anxiety, sleep deprivation, eating disorders, self-harm and suicide ideation.

The National Youth Assembly were invited to nominate two delegates to be part of this taskforce. Brianna and Donnacha have taken on this role and will sit on the taskforce until the report is delivered. They will liaise between the taskforce and the Assembly. An Assembly will be held on the topic of this taskforce in 2025 and Brianna and Donnacha will be key advisors on convening this Assembly.





## Delegates representing on forums and advisory groups

#### **Road Safety Authority - Youth Forum**





Katy and Daniel joined a number of other young people aged 12-25 from across Ireland on the Road Safety Authorities Youth Forum. The forum aims to start a conversation and provide a safe space for young people to discuss their common road safety concerns.

## Education for Sustainable Development Youth Advisory Group

This year six members of the National Youth Assembly joined a number of other young people from Comhairle na nÓg who formed a Youth Advisory Panel for the Ninth National Forum on Education for Sustainable Development Forum. Naomhán, Alana, Aifric, Aodhán, Stuart and Ash sat on the YAP and this was a year long commitment for the delegates. They worked with the organisers of the event to organise an intergenerational panel discussion on ESD led by Professor Laura Lundy.

### **Events attended by Delegates in 2024**

Throughout the year delegates are invited to attend and take part in many different, events, committees and conferences. All opportunities are shared with the delegates, they voluntarily put themselves forward and a random selection takes place. The delegates commit to this as an additional extra on top of their Assembly duties and are supported in their roles by the Assembly staff.

### An Introduction to Children and young people's participation in decision making workshop

In June of this year Hub na nÓg and the National Participation Office jointly planned and delivered four two hour workshops. As part of the workshop two delegates from the National Youth Assembly Alanna and Jack presented on their experiences of participation in decision making and their membership of the Assembly.





#### National Climate Stakeholder Forum

On the 28th February, 3 members of the Youth Assembly attended the 5th National Climate Stakeholder Forum. Rocarya, Jack and Molly were active participants at the event which took place in the Convention Centre in Dublin. On the day there were many presentations from both Government and Non Government Organisations talking about progress and projects in Climate Action. One presentation talked about Irish attitudes and beliefs around Climate Change. The Climate Change in the Irish Mind 2023 report was very interesting and the delegates at the upcoming National Youth Assembly on Climate will be discussing the importance of engaging with people on this topic



#### Youth At the Table Event



Six representatives from the Assembly attended the 'Youth at the Table: Youth Engagement and Dialogues Shaping Public Policy event hosted by the Dutch Embassy on the 30th October. MJ, Mateusz, Jace, Alana, Marwa and Roisin heard from Irish and Dutch youth representatives and discussed issues facing young people on a national, european and global basis.

### National Sustainable Mobility Forum - Portlaoise

'On the 23rd of May, Jack, Aisling and I attended the National Sustainability Mobility Forum in Portlaoise. The event kicked off about nine o'clock where were treated to a panel discussion on the new Sustainable Mobility Framework. After a quick break, Aisling and I presented along with three other youth delegates about what the future of sustainable transport looks like from our perspective. We did a Newsflash style presentation to give both a utopian and dystopian world looks like depending on what decisions we make over the coming years. Following on from the successful presentation we then sat on a panel to answer audience questions where we were delighted to welcome questions from many of the participants present, the Minister along with other key figures in the National Transport Authority, advocacy groups and non-for-profits engaged in this discussion. I was especially happy to meet my local councillor and exchange viewpoints about my local area. To wrap the day up there was a final discussion from experts in areas of infrastructure, management and from people doing the on the ground work about what we need to be focusing on at the moment. It was altogether a highly rewarding experience and I can't wait to see some of our contributions being published in the report coming out soon.'

## National Economic Dialogue - Dublin Castle

#### National Human Rights Commission Conference - Taiwan

The Assembly were delighted to continue their relationship with Taiwan in 2024. We received an invitation from the National Human Rights Commission in Taiwan to present at their conference in August. Three members prepared and recorded two presentations on the National Youth Assembly of Ireland. The first shared the background of the Assembly and where the Assembly has influence. The second looked at the processes used and where the recommendations are shared. Well done to Aisling, Alfie and Caoimhe for all their hard work on this project.





### **Delegate Day**

The National Youth Assembly YAG held a Delegate Day in July. This was an opportunity for delegates to get to know each other outside of a busy Assembly day. It also provided an opportunity for the delegates to raise topics they felt passionate about and discuss these. The YAG also invited a number of people to take part in a Human Library. Dr Niall Muldoon the Ombudsman for Children, Vivienne Parry head of Advocacy and Child Rights with UNICEF, David Kavanagh Jigsaws Youth Voice Engagement Manager and Aidan O'Hara, Civil Servant engaged with the delegates and answered lots of questions.


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#### Social Media

At the beginning of 2024 the Youth Advisory Group made it a priority to establish a social media presence for the National Youth Assembly. #### **Assembly Youth Advisory Groups**

The role of the Youth Advisory Groups or YAGs cannot be underestimated in success of the National Youth Assembly of Ireland.

There have been four YAGs this year. These meetings take place online in the late evenings once the delegates are home from school, college or work. There is a strong level of commitment from the young people to attend these meetings with competing priorities of school work, college work and even just getting their dinner!

However alongside lots of work, the YAGs are a great opportunity for the delegates to get to know each other.

- National Youth Assembly YAG: This YAG is an oversight group for the Assembly as a whole. They review the Assemblies together to identify gaps and best practices. This YAG can identify areas that they wish to progress based on their knowledge and previous evaluations from past Assemblies. This YAG meet regularly with the Play and Participation Unit of the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth.
- Climate YAG: This group worked on the planning and preparation for the National Youth Assembly on Climate. The delegates met with representatives from the Department of Environment, Climate and Communication at the beginning of the year and alongside Assembly staff assisted with the planning of the Assembly, including identifying guest speakers, testing methodologies and hosting the Preparation Session and the Assembly itself.
- Gender Equality YAG: The Gender Equality YAG convened in early 2024 to assist with the planning of the first National Youth Assembly on Gender Equality. This Assembly was different in that Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth wanted to hear from the delegates in order to inform the successor strategy to the Strategy for Women and Girls. The Assembly would identify themes on this topic which were of most importance to young people. This YAG worked a lot on deciding which methodologies would work for this purpose.
- Rural YAG: The final YAG of the year was the Rural Youth Advisory
  Group. This YAG worked on identifying a theme for this years
  Assembly along with the Department of Rural and Community
  Development. There was a priority in accessing rural youth voices for
  this Assembly and the YAG worked with Assembly staff on the best
  processes to use to ensure these young people were identified.











#### **Assembly Preparation Sessions**

Each Assembly begins a few weeks in advance with an online preparation session. At this meeting the delegates hear from guest experts on the themes and topics which are up for discussion.

I wanted to take this opportunity to tell you a little bit about what this has meant for me. As we all know the National Youth Assembly organises meetings and events where young people are given the opportunity to speak about important issues, work on projects, speak to politicians and more. Young Voices does similar work, the only real difference being that they do it at a European level as well as a national one. Getting to be apart of the NYA meant that I was able to hear the opinions of more young people, by passing on this information to Young Voices some of this information could be used at a European level, therefore amplifying the voices of young Irish people even more. Many of the topics discussed as NYA assemblies have been very similar to those discussed by the Young Voices.
